And they showed those of us, who have had many more birthdays, the joy of giving.



When three kittens were born outside a local business to an unowned community cat, the business asked CARE to help. CARE fosters cared for the kittens and found all three loving forever homes. Mom was trapped, but she was only comfortable as a community cat. So, she was neutered and released back into her colony. Her whole colony is given food and fresh water twice every week, and all have been spayed and neutered.

When I organized a camp for 1st - 3rd graders and 4th - 6th graders, called "Animal Advocacy", I wanted to partner with an animal rescue organization so I could donate the proceeds from the camp directly to them. Among the many rescue organizations, CARE responded the most enthusiastically in wanting to participate in bringing animal welfare education to kids. I felt a genuine care and selfless passion in their efforts to help abandoned and abused dogs and cats that came their way. I heard personal stories, saw the photos and met the animals they helped. Along with games and crafts, kids learned ways to identify and help animals in need. The camp was a success! Proceeds from the camp went into much needed resources to help rescue and take care of the dogs and cats that depend on us, love us, and provide enormous benefits, but are often neglected and abused.
